Engagement

South Australia faces a range of immediate skills challenges that need to be addressed as a matter of priority including:

285 occupations in shortage, up from 149 in 2021

(National Skills Commission, 2022)

190,000 people with VET qualifications needed by 2032

(SA Government analysis of ABS Labour Force Survey 2023)

Completion rates for VET qualifications below 50%

(National Council for Vocational Education and Research, 2022)

1 in 5 young South Australians not fully engaged in study or work

(Australian Bureau of Statistics 2023)

Alongside the comprehensive training and skills election commitments being delivered, the South Australian Government is developing a long-term South Australian Skills Plan to ensure the skills system delivers the skilled workforce needed for the future.

The immediate actions

Skilled people

Feedback themes:

Strengthen **connections** between learners, providers and employers

Improve **information availability** for learners

Increase **support for learners** to enhance their wellbeing and increase completions

Immediate responses:

- > Skills Centres grants to trial new hubs that connect learners, training providers and employers and get more local people into local jobs
- ➤ Website develop an easy to use, one stop shop for VET information providing learners with the information needed to make informed choices about their training pathways
- Learner Support expand wellbeing and wrap around support services before and during training, and for graduates transitioning into work

Skills system

Feedback themes:

Explore alternative training **delivery models** to enhance the VET system

Develop **products and services** that are responsive to local and emerging needs

Immediate responses:

Addressing Skills Shortages – grants to tackle current and emerging skills shortages in key sectors including defence, cookery, bricklaying, concreting and saw technology

Successful economy

Feedback themes:

Develop workforce planning and **success measures** that are timely and connected to needs and outcomes

Strengthen **partnerships** between all stakeholders connected to training to meet local and strategic skill need

Immediate responses:

- Skills Outlook annual release of current and emerging skills needs to South Australia to better target skills investment and ensure it is aligned to the needs of the economy
- More Women in Trades grants to attract and retain more women in trades across the state

Building on the Government's significant investments

These responses build on South Australia's significant investments in skills and training including:

Trades outreach to schools

\$1m over four years to deliver an outreach program into schools to encourage students to consider taking up a building trade as a future career path.

Automotive trades mentoring program

Expand 'industry hubs' by utilising existing initiatives to link learners with targeted career advice and employment opportunities.

Fee free TAFE and VET

\$65m partnership with the Australian Government to address skills shortages and delivery fee-free TAFE and vocational education places in South Australia. 110 courses in priority industry growth sectors for 12,500 students.

New technical colleges

\$208.8m over four years for five new technical colleges, including two in regional South Australia (Mount Gambier and Port Augusta).

Upgrades to Mount Gambier TAFE SA campus

\$5m to upgrade facilities and equipment to further increase the enrolment and retention of students in the region.

Adult and community education

\$4m over four years to support adults to develop foundation skills.
